Message from the Executive Director & Board President

or the past two years, the pandemic changed our lives in many ways. Through the fear and anxiety, *May Dugan Center* stepped forward to not only continue the baseline of our operations but also expand and grow our services.

In 2020, we quickly changed the way we delivered our services for the safety of our clients, staff and many volunteers allowing our six core programs to continue to operate. In 2021, we expanded upon those services to meet emerging community needs. In addition, we continued to work with our team of architects, construction crew and steering committee members to make progress on our Capital Campaign.

We are proud of our growth over the past year, including:

- The City of Cleveland decided to turn the ownership of the building to the May Dugan Center. For the past 47 years, May Dugan has been operating and managing the building. This was essential for funding and financing purposes.
- Over \$4 million has been raised toward the \$7 million goal of the Capital Campaign and other prospects are pending.
- In partnership with the Greater Cleveland Food Bank, the May Dugan Center is now one of the largest food pantries in their six county jurisdiction.
- We expanded *Behavioral Health Services* to include intensive outpatient day treatment.
- Our team grew with the addition of an Aging Therapist and in-house Workforce Development Coordinator.
- For the first time ever *May Dugan Center* received an allocation in the State of Ohio biennium budget.

We have all grown in unimaginable ways over the last two years. Your generous support has kept the *May Dugan Center* strongly rooted in its mission to help people enrich and advance their lives and communities. For that, we thank you.

Building On Our legacy...

THE LAST TWO YEARS HAVE BEEN LIKE NO OTHER, YET MAY DUGAN CENTER CONTINUES TO MOVE FORWARD WITH ITS CAPITAL CAMPAIGN. THE INCREASE IN REQUESTS FOR SERVICE HAVE ONLY AMPLIFIED THE NEED FOR A LARGER, MODERN SPACE FROM WHICH TO OPERATE AND CONTINUE TO MEET THE NEEDS OF THE COMMUNITY.

Campaign Impact

- Increased services to families, children, and people in need through increased physical capacity.
- Improved use of existing offices and common areas to create a safe, welcome, and therapeutic environment for those in need.
- Increased cost savings through updated and efficient building systems meeting green building standards.
- Increased food pantry capacity from 287 square feet to 630 square feet, doubling dry storage and nearly quadrupling freezer space.
- An IT infrastructure that supports the modern workplace, including provision of virtual programming and telehealth.
- Doubles the number of meeting rooms to support additional group therapy.
- Brings the building into adherence with the American with Disabilities Act, ensuring accessibility for all.

Campaign and Construction Progress

- At the end of 2021, the Campaign has secured 60% of the funding needed through the generous support of individuals, corporations, foundations, and governmental sources.
- Masonry and roof repairs started in 2021 and continued into 2022. The main renovation of the project is slated to begin in the Summer of 2022.

Health Services

Behavioral

Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF) assures that programming is of the highest quality. The program also provides case management, support to the lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBTQ) community, Substance Use Disorder, and Intensive Outpatient services.

Case Management Services, offered in both English and Spanish, helps clients find affordable housing and employment, with case managers navigating housing programs and assisting in traversing employment options.

Substance Use Disorder (SUD) meets community needs by addressing the debilitating results of addiction and its effects on society. Through individual counseling, Intensive Outpatient programming (IOP), and support groups, the SUD provides easily accessible treatment to clients who face barriers in getting the help they need.

LGBTQ Community Support provides lesbian, gay, bi-sexual, and transgender (LGBT) adults and youth with counseling for long-term HIV/AIDS survivors, as well as facilitating Gay Straight Alliance (GSA) groups in schools to address the unique barriers and issues that face LGBT youth.

Intensive Outpatient Services helps clients learn skills to manage emotions, communicate effectively, manage daily living activities, reduce distress, and live a happy and healthy life.

John's Story

Dylan, one of **May Dugan Center's** social workers, has worked tirelessly with John throughout the year. John recently stopped using drugs and had life-saving surgery. He is no longer homeless and is receiving help with managing his health issues. Most importantly, John has hope and feels less alone.

Basic Meeds

The *Basic Needs* program provides a safety net for those in need through twice-monthly mass food distribution, daily emergency food bags, clothing distribution, assistance with vaccine access, rental and utility assistance. In the spirit of its namesake, *May Dugan Center* strives to be the place people turn to when facing hardship. The tremendous growth of the Basic Needs program over the last two years has resulted in May Dugan Center being one of the largest food distribution sites in the Greater Cleveland Food Bank's six-county region.

Betty's Story

Betty, a long-time participant in the Seniors on the Move program, was instantly added to the Basic Needs home delivery list for food distribution when the pandemic started. In early 2021 Betty needed to address health issues she had been experiencing with a diet change. It was important to her to take charge of her diet and be able to select the foods coming into her home. Since Betty lives nearby in Ohio City, and knowing the importance of walking to her overall health, she began to walk to May Dugan Center to select her food from Basic Needs' available emergency food. May Dugan Center is proud to support food pantry choice and Betty's health journey.

Trauma Recovery Center

The *Trauma Recovery Center* brings together law enforcement, hospitals, community agencies, and the *May Dugan Center* to provide immediate help and support to victims of violent crime. Along with crisis management and safety planning, *May Dugan Center* staff provide trauma-based education, advocacy, coordination of care, support, and stabilization to help victims grow into survivors.

Sonya's Story

In December 2020, Sonya's partner stabbed her over thirty times and then took his own life, leaving her for dead. When finally released from the hospital, Sonya found an eviction notice on her door and threats from her partner's family members. Cleveland Police referred Sonya to May Dugan Center. Darrylyn, May Dugan Center staff, helped Sonya get the eviction notice rescinded and advocated for a housing transfer. With help from staff, Sonya moved, started trauma therapy, and found a less physically demanding job so she could continue healing. May Dugan Center staff also connected Sonya to The Family Justice Center to get help with obtaining a protection order to stop the threats. Sonya's old landlord took her to court, claiming damages to the house where she was attacked. Less than a year after the event that nearly stole her life, Sonya was ready for court, documents in order, and stood in her truth. The court, and May Dugan Center staff, stood with her.

Momsfirst

Infant mortality is a leading indicator of a community's overall health and vibrancy. Cuyahoga County has historically had one of the highest rates of infant mortality in the country. The *MomsFirst* program at *May Dugan Center* works to break down barriers to healthy pregnancy and infancy. *MomsFirst* staff provides outreach, case management, health education, and perinatal depression screenings to young mothers through a unique partnership with the City of Cleveland Department of Public Health, the Cleveland Metropolitan School District, and Charter Schools within the City of Cleveland with the goal of reducing infant mortality and increasing healthy birth outcomes.

Lynda's Story

Lynda enrolled in the MomsFirst program at 16, determined to finish school and have her child see her walk across the stage. Lynda studied cosmetology and rarely missed a day of school, even returning shortly after the birth of her baby girl. ShenettaMarie, Lynda's Certified Community Health Worker, supported Lynda's emotional needs throughout her pregnancy and early days of motherhood, making sure to remind her that it was okay to enjoy her teenage years and prioritize cheerleading over a part-time job. The focus on school and cheerleading has paid off. Lynda has been accepted to the Early College Early Career program and accepted for a paid internship at Lincoln Electric. Lynda's future is shining bright!

Seniors On the Move

May Dugan Center provides the tools to help older adults stay active and engaged in their community through Seniors on the Move. The goal of the program is to empower older adults with the resources necessary to help better manage financial, physical, and emotional well-being as well deepen social connections in order to support aging. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, services were primarily offered virtually in 2021. This meant 2021 was filled with zoom meetings, technology education, music therapy, and home deliveries.

Maria's Story

Long-time Seniors on the Move participant Maria uses May Dugan Center services to stay independent and active in the community. Maria met with Peter Katsilis for case management services for help locating safe, affordable housing. When Maria needed assistance with job placement, SOTM Coordinator Vanessa Jackson reached out to the newly hired Workforce Development Coordinator Glenn Odenbrett to help Maria secure employment. Glenn identified barriers in Maria's employment search. In just a few sessions, Glenn helped Maria overcome her barriers, and she quickly obtained a new job. Wraparound services at May Dugan Center are helping Maria thrive and she is thrilled to be back to work.

Education Resource Center

100% of those securing jobs received follow-up services for 90 days

The *Education Resource Center (ERC)* at the *May Dugan Center* provides Adult Basic Literacy, high school equivalency test preparation, English for Speakers of Other Languages, college entrance support, and workforce development in a safe, calm classroom environment. *ERC* services remained virtual or one on one throughout 2021, with teachers adjusting to meet students' needs and goals. During the summer the ERC was able to hold its first ever graduation ceremony to celebrate the hard work of ERC students.




