Message From Our Executive Director

This fall will complete my fourteenth year as the Executive Director of the May Dugan Center. As I reflect over the years in my role, one of the major challenges has been the management of the building. I clearly remember asking a former staff member for a copy of the lease that we had with the City of Cleveland Department of Community Development, so I could better understand my responsibilities, and she said it had been expired for 11 years. My reaction was, "well there is a breakdown in communication between MDC and the City!"

The building was originally funded by the Housing and Urban Development when President Johnson launched the "war on poverty" and built multi-service centers with the idea to have a place to house multiple Health and Human Services agencies under one roof, so clients in need could benefit from multiple programs. Once we were able to renegotiate an updated lease with the city, we began to have many issues with the HVAC system, roof leaks, unlevel sidewalks and so much more.

The May Dugan Center building committee became very active and made recommendations to the full board of directors to begin long overdue assessments and feasibility studies for the future use of the building. This past March, the City decided to transfer the ownership of the building to May Dugan and we are grateful for that support.

With support from local foundations and other sources, a feasibility study was conducted and resulted in plans to renovate and expand the facility for May Dugan Center programs and our tenants. While our original goal was to raise \$5.5 million, we were faced with a worldwide pandemic that increased our goal to \$7.4 million, due to inflation and supply chain delays. Almost five years later, it is heartwarming to report that we have raised nearly 90% of our goal through support from local foundations, government entities, individuals, and other sources. And we have broken ground, officially kicking off construction on the long-awaited renovation and expansion. We will continue to manage our six core programs throughout the renovation and expansion project and plan for a "grand reopening" in 2024. Please pardon our dust when you come to visit during construction. We know the end results will be so worth it! Thank you to the leadership of our campaign and to all of our sponsors and many individuals that have made this significant project possible. We are still in need of support to get us to 100% of our \$7.4 million goal.

The construction fences are up, the walls of the west side of the building will come down, and the interior will be reconfigured to better serve all. One thing will never change – the work of May Dugan Centers Board Directors and Staff and the difference they make to thousands!




EDUCATION RECOURCE CENTER

Dollars For Doses

May Dugan Center partnered with Walgreens and the Funders Collaborative on Covid Recovery to present two Dollars for Doses vaccine clinics. People were rewarded for getting the vaccine and helping keep our community healthy.

At the first vaccine clinic May Dugan Center was able to help 164 people get a shot, many of whom were getting their first COVID-19 vaccine. May Dugan Center is proud of hosting the largest clinics of the summer. At the second clinic, we were able to exceed our goal and helped 189 people receive vaccines.
